As well as making an immediate difference, students helped raise awareness about the importance of protecting our planet and taking pride in our surroundings. A brilliant effort from all involved.

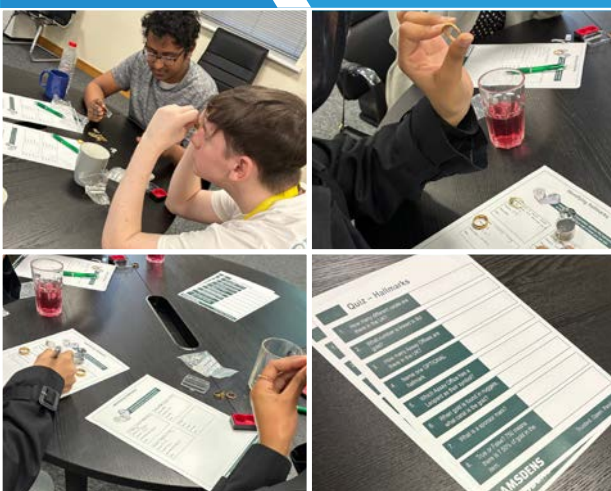
POST 16 FOOTBALL SUCCESS

By observing and drawing the gills, students explored how specialised structures maximise oxygen uptake, sparking great discussion on counter-current flow and ventilation.

Whilst at the University the students had a Q&A with Middlesbrough FC Ladies, including Armani Maxwell, an ex-Macmillan student. In the afternoon sessions the students were involved in a taping session, biomechanics and even had to undertake a bike/run in a humidity chamber!

BIOLOGY - TEESSIDE UNIVERSITY

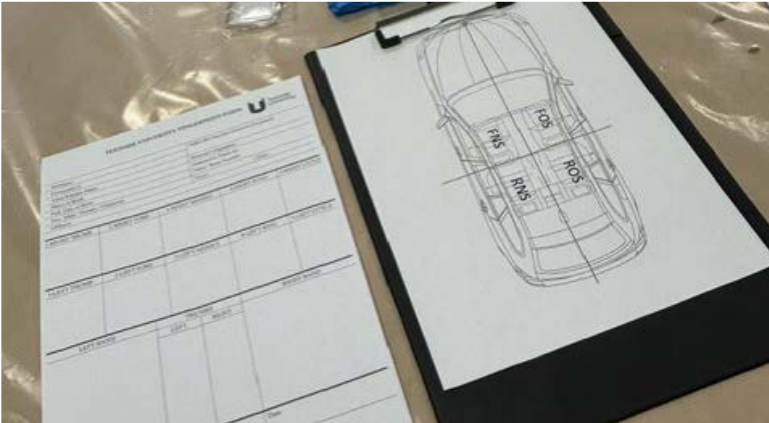

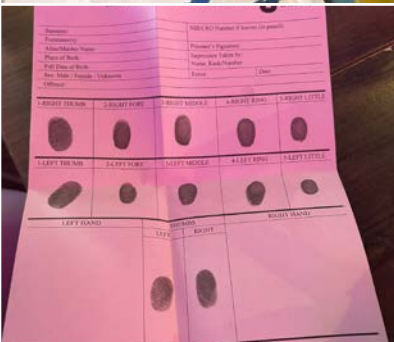
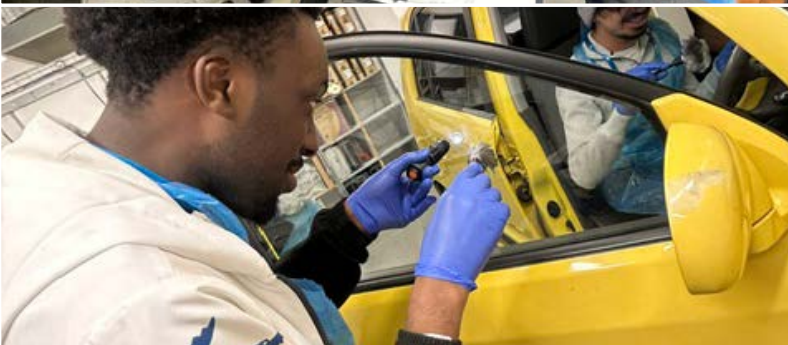
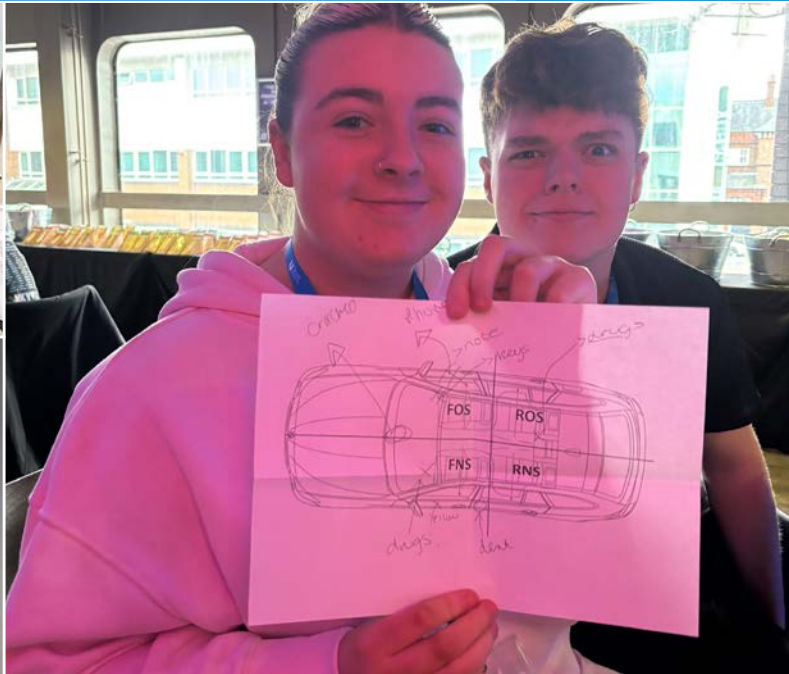
Throughout the day, students rotated through a series of interactive workshops led by university academics and specialist practitioners. Activities included crime-scene examination, fingerprint analysis, digital forensics demonstrations, and sessions exploring criminal behaviour and the justice system. Students were encouraged to think critically, problem-solve collaboratively, and experience the tools and techniques used by professionals working in criminology-related fields.

The visit offered valuable enrichment for learners studying psychology, sociology and criminology, giving them a taste of university-level study and potential future career pathways. Staff praised students for their engagement, curiosity, and thoughtful questions throughout the event.

Opportunities like Crime Day continue to strengthen Macmillan Academy's strong partnership with Teesside University and provide Post 16 learners with meaningful experiences beyond the classroom.

BEAMISH MUSEUM VISIT

Our history department recently took 35 Year 9 students on a trip to Beamish Museum, where they explored a range of historical settings including the Victorian street, the 1950s town, and the pit village. As part of the visit, students also participated in a “Call to War” workshop designed to deepen their understanding of the First World War.

The workshop was highly engaging. Students were set the task of interviewing the villagers in the pit village to investigate why a young boy had chosen to enlist and fight on the front line in WW1. They threw themselves into the activity, asking thoughtful questions and piecing together the motivations and pressures faced by people at the time.

They also took part in a light-hearted drill exercise, which certainly caught the attention of other visitors and added a fun, dynamic element to the day. Our students had a fantastic experience and thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to explore history in an immersive and hands-on way that truly brought the past to life. They were an absolute credit to the academy throughout the visit.

DOFE PROGRAMME - BRONZE AWARD
